EK BAAT GURU KE SAATH - Dr. Snehlata Deshmukh

Hello everyone today for our 'Ek Baat Guru ke Saath' we have with us Dr. Snehlata Shamrao Deshmukh who was the Vice Chancellor of the University of Mumbai from 1995–2000. She was dean of the Sion hospital. She is an eminent pediatric surgeon in India. She was a pioneer and one of the founders of the neo-natal department of KEM Hospital. She is also an eminent management member of PTVA.

1. "As you know PTVA completed 100 years this year how do you think such esteemed and established institute help the society to be a better place?"

->PTVA started with a very small beginning in 21 when Lokmanya Tilak Expired. Inspired by sensitivity, hard work, capacity to understand, input in education, the people from Vile Parle East came together and decided to have a school in his name. There were no schools at that time so, to nurture this motive they started a school and now this association has grown into a big banyan tree with 5 school Including one ICSE school, two English medium school and two Marathi medium school. We have Sathye College of Arts, Science and Commerce and also run M.L. Dahanukar college of Commerce. All of them have applied for autonomous position now. Autonomy is the need of day to day because 900 colleges have affiliated with Mumbai university is an impossible task. In order to this, people have come with the idea of decentralization and this can be achieved through autonomy. But while granting autonomy there must be some criterion for giving autonomy. The criterion must include the standing of the college, years of it's established, results of the college and the profile of the college and get 'A' grade from NAAC. Then this paper has to be submitted to Mumbai University, later with the UGC and then they decide to worth giving autonomy status to colleges. Now we have started various new courses and the latest edition is the 'Centre for Entrepreneurship Innovation and Inspiration' and recently we got permission to start this centre which is run by Institute of Management affiliated with University of Mumbai. Nowadays you must have heard word START-UP and this centre will help students to become business oriented.

You may also know that nowadays with this covid situation various things are happening, companies are shut down, shops are also closed and also the clerical jobs in banks and other institutions are not very helpful. In such case instead of we finding jobs we should create jobs; this is our motive. "We shall be job creator rather than job seeker". We also have started a start-up and since we got permission of starting this centre, we will surely create good entrepreneurs. I myself is closely related with this centre and I spend my most of the time to work out this centre effectively. In schools also, we have started with various programmes which will make theory subject more effective where bookish knowledge will be replaced by practical knowledge. We have also started to promote the Marathi language along with Sanskrit. Sanskrit language is a very rich language and nowadays it's becoming fade so, we have decided to concentrate on Sanskrit. In these 100 years, we have achieved value education. In a way we are not rich institutions but we are rich with values, ethics and custom and that is the reason why PTVA is one of the most respected institutions not only in Vile Parle but also all over Mumbai.



The contribution of PTVAs to strengthen the society is of immense importance. Many charitable objects are also carried out by us so, that we can make society with individual full of knowledge, ethics and most importantly Humanity.

- 2. "What is your take on this online mode of learning and how would you rate it from a teacher's POV?" ->Online mode of learning has been started before covid because that is one aspect which can conduct normally. Even if you are not able to come to the college you can still listen to the lecture at home. So, it is a good method but at the same time it should be use very conveniently and properly because you go with screen time of the child. The screen time which is given should not more than an hour. Continuous looking at the screen can affect the retina of the eye so there has to be break of 15 minutes to give rest to the eyes after 45 minutes of lecture. This break gives rest to the eyes, rest to the neck, rest to the muscle because the muscle gets stiff when you sit in position looking at the screen all the time so, you have ache in neck, you have ache in back and other problems. So, the mantra is every hour you should take a walk, close your eyes for 5 minutes and then start again so your vision doesn't get affected. Therefore, the problem of online learning has to be effective and not a burden to body.
- 3. "You are also a well-known doctor how mental health along with physical well-being is important especially in pandemic times?"
- ->In this pandemic times practically about 65 to 75 percent of people get affected. This happens because of depressing scenario all over the media. People have taken vaccines and yet taking vaccines people got affected by covid so there is fear. The fear complex has to be monitored properly and main difficulty in this times that, you cannot go to the gym. You can't take a morning walk. This all are depressing things but there are various other probabilities. As in a very small house how will you exercise? it gets difficult but you can certainly do skipping, you can do jogging, you can even exercise in small place, provided you have the desire to do. You can do yoga you can do Surya namaskar and then deep breathing doesn't need any space. Lie down on your chest, close your eyes, take a long deep breath, control the nostril and leave it immediately. This keeps your lungs well. Your pulmonary function improves. Have a diet with more protein and less carbohydrates and fats. Proteins are very important and keep your diet well balanced. Have milk, curd, home-made butter and home-made ghee. Sprouts is another thing full of protein. Avoid consuming junk food, outside juices. Make a juice at home and drink. It is much better because the outside juice is full of preservative. Preservatives are bad for health. It's much better to eat fruits. Everybody talks of immunity nowadays; immunity depends on what type of diet you take and what type of exercise you do.

- " 4. " You were the chancellor of University of Mumbai How's your experience there?"
- ->Sometimes it's good and sometimes not so good. Opportunity always there for those who work hard. One incident I would like to tell you, we have two campuses, one is at Kalina and the other is at Raja Bhai Chowk. It takes about 45 minutes from Raja bhai Chowk to Kalina campus and the examination department is at Kalina, whereas the Raja Bhai Chowk has administrative department. One day I was walking around and there were many students wanted to know the date of examination and the staff was not aware of dates as it's decided at Kalina so, I told them to find out the date. So, you are doing your job you must do your duty. If you are not aware of dates make a call to your colleagues and get the dates. Due to such work environment, you get frustrated depressed but you have to carry on. Everybody is not student oriented. Mine first preference is students and then anything else. My happiest memory in the university is that, when a girl who was appearing for exam from the college and her delivery was same as the scheduled dates of exam on the previous day, she telephones me in the early morning at about 3 am and she said 'I delivered just now and my paper is at 11 am, will I be able to appear'? I said 'how will you come here from the hospital; nobody will allow you to come from the hospital'. She said 'I'll manage that'. So immediately at 5am I talked with the official of examination and asked them that this is an unusual situation where a girl has delivered, we decided to help her. We decided to send her paper, she sat, wrote and given it back. Believe me she got distinction in that paper and that was the happiest moment in my life. I was extremely happy that I was able to convince the board and we could do it.
- 5. "What message or as we students call it Guru Mantra you want to share it with us?"
- -> Actually, Dahanukar College students, I have found they are really very good, they are down to earth, they study well, they also participate in extracurricular activities, they are good human beings, they don't need any great advice. I will advise only TO BE SINCERE, continue to help your colleague and be kind.
- 6. "What message would you give to your fellow teachers?"
- -> When you are teaching you teach the student from what all you got. Communicating with the students asking about their difficulties, try to solve the difficulties if you can and see to it that you are not only mentor but you are a parent.

KAR HAR MAIDAN FATEH Interview of our principal Dr. Dyaneshwar Doke

Introduction

Hello everyone today we have the principal of M.L. DAHANUKAR college of commerce DR. DYANESHWAR DOKE sir with us. We are very glad to have you and welcome you to THE STUDENT PRESS interview. So now without wasting anymore time we will start with our interview.

"You are looked up to a person of Great esteem. What are the struggles you faced in your early years?" -> I do not call it struggle; people claim that in starting years we struggle but I personally don't call it struggle. Though I have come from a very small place still I was from a quite comfortable family. My parents being illiterate, yet very much aware about education so they always supported my education. I am very fortunate because there were quite a few students around me; they were not getting an opportunity to get education. I was lucky, I was getting. So, I don't call it struggle as such. It is a part of the game, life goes on. On the other hand, I feel personally whatever opportunity I got if another student got this opportunity, they could have done better. So, I feel sorry for their struggle and not mine, because they couldn't come up with this. They deserve much more, but because there were some financial problems, not much awareness about education, family was not keen in educating children, etc They suffered on the contrary that is not the case with me. Since I was from remote area there was not much exposure but whatever surrounding I was, I was much sheltered.

"How do you think that earning in college days along with academics important?"

->Look, there are two things, one if you really need to support your family financially then you must EARN AND LEARN; but if your family does not require your financial support then one must learn. I don't assert earning is something not advisable, but one must focus on learning because this is the time where you can learn many things. I believe that once you start earning in future as a worker or a full time employee you may not get opportunity to learn many things.



So, if it is possible to sustain financially without your income and your family can support your education, I will advise you should explore learning, reading not only curriculum but also extra-curriculum. In my opinion, instead of entering into market as a raw product, better to enter into market as a finished product. So of course, it is not possible for each and every one, some have to earn and now due to this pandemic many student's parents have lost their jobs so in that case students have to support their family financially. But, if possible, student should first acquire maximum knowledge and then enter into the job. At the same time, I respect those who do earn and learn business, of course there are some students who have to support their family financially, I respect them. I am not disrespecting earning while learning but if possible if you can learn without earning then you can learn more things comparatively. You can utilize that time to enhance your knowledge related to your subject, surrounding depending upon your area of interest, in short increase your knowledge.

"As a principal and a teacher of our institution, how would you rate the Online mode of teaching?"

->Every teaching method have some merits and demerits. Offline teaching does have some merits and demerits, similarly Online teaching have some merits and demerits. I think that, teaching is best when it is a combination of offline and online. Right now, we are online, not because of this is the best mode of teaching but because it is the last alternative and there is no other alternative. First thing is education should not stop, learning process should not stop, so to continue the education process, we have adopted online teaching. But what I prefer personally that blended learning and teaching is the thing what will help. So, when we will stop online mode where will we share online material, conduct online examination, every time students don't have to come in college, this is one thing. Secondly, the online mode is not much interactive and looking at the strength of our classrooms of about 120 students, it is very difficult to catch up with each and every student so there we must have offline lectures for interaction. As I said blended learning that is the mixture of offline and online is advisable or is good instead of only online or only offline.

"In a what ways you think that we students can make the most of such a depressing situation. How we can make 'A Aapda into Awsar'?"

-> Good question!! Basically, every event we should turn into opportunity right? Yes. So whatever problem that you come across the life, search for opportunity in that. Here now in this pandemic period, OK you are learning online. You cannot go offline because of so many restrictions, you are not allowed; but at the same time, you have a lot of time with you, in Mumbai traffic you spend much time on travelling. On the contrary, today is not that scenario, so they can use this as an opportunity to upgrade themselves, to update, to study more, to read more; not necessarily only academics but also non-academics, or some literature, or they can also pursue their hobbies. One must enhance their knowledge, have yoga, do meditation and many things, in short utilize their time to the fullest. At normal course you don't have much time at home. Be with your family, talk with them. So, like this you can do many things and explore your selves when you have lot of time at disposal.

"What message would you give to your fellow teachers as a principal and also as a teacher?" ->Fellow teachers! Due to pandemic, they are also using this online method of teaching. Initially quite few of us were not comfortable with this but by this time we have learned this mode of teaching. I will say that they should upgrade themselves more and more, interact with the students in this online mode, share assignments with the students, etc. Fellow teachers are updating notes to the students. I find because of online mode there is limitation on interaction still teachers are doing their best out of this situation.

TAX EXEMPTION TO COVID AFFECTED

The center exempted tax on expenses incurred on Covid-19 treatment of an employee-borne by employers or any another person for FY-20 (AY 2021-22) and later.

This exemption is applicable to any amount paid by the employer and limited to Rs. 10 lakhs if received from any other person. The move comes to relief to hundreds of taxpayers affected by pandemic. The ministry said many taxpayers have received financial help from their well-wishers for meeting expenses on Covid-19 treatment.

In order to ensure no income tax liability on this account, it has decided to provide income tax exemption to the amount received by a taxpayer for medical treatment during FY-20 (AY 2021-22) and subsequent years.

Ex-Gratia payments received by family members of a person who has died due to Covid-19 from an employer will also be a tax exempt without any limit. Such a payment from other persons aggregating to Rs. 10 lakhs will be tax exempt, the Central Board Direct Taxes announced.

Besides tax exemptions, the ministry has also provided relief on various tax compliance measures, and extended deadlines for the same.

Human Trafficking in India: A dint for Indians

Abstract

India is a prominent hub and third rank in the human trafficking which is an international crime. The root of human trafficking is deeper in a few states like West Bengal, Rajasthan, UP, Assam, Odisha, Tamilnadu, Maharashtra and UT like Delhi. Due to this crime human rights are exploited and increasing rate of this crime is alarming India for the prevention of it. The research review is showing about the increasing percentage of this crime in India with various way like reasons, methods, previous and current recorded cases which shows this crime is increased four times more than the previous record.

Introduction:

Just for a few pennies, human absolutely drowned into the graveyards, and smuggled weaker group of the society like women and children for sexual exploitation, removal of organs or slavery. The network of human trafficking is spread all over world, which is third rate biggest crime in the world andunfortunately in India the rate of this crime is very high. Illiteracy, money for livelihood, poor laws, and unawareness of the punishment of the crime are some of the reasons for increasing this offense on large scale level. Close to 80% of the human trafficking across the world is done for sexual exploitation and the rest is for bonded labour and India is considered as the hub of this crime in Asia. As per the statistics of the government – in every eight minutes a child goes missing in our country. In 2011 about 35,000 children were reported missing and more than 11,000 out of these were from West Bengal. Further, it is assumed that only 30% of the total cases are reported, so the actual number is pretty high.

According to P.M. Nair, trading of human or prostitution is more than and differing from the human trafficking. It includes not just exploitation of prostitution of others or forms of sexual exploitation, it also includes forced labour or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery or trade in human beings for removal of organs. It shows that trafficking is wider concept including so many crimes at a time. Further he penned down that, trafficking clearly violates the fundamental right to a life with dignity, right to health and health care, right to liberty and security of person, right to freedom from torture, violence, cruelty or degrading treatment. It violates for children who have been trafficked, or victims of child marriages their right to education, it violates the right to employment and the right of self-determination. Parents in tribal areas think that sending their kids means a better life in terms of education and safety. Parents also pay about Rs 6000-7000 to these agents for food and shelter. The paper is throwing light on the review of the researchers' thoughts, and comparative study of the situation within the last few years and now. It's a simple study of the proliferation of human trafficking in India and violation of fundamental rights of women and children.

Statement of the problems:

In India many of the states are involving in the human trafficking of women and children and basically many researchers highlighted that, the criminal find out the prey from various parts of India and complete their tasks. Due to poverty many families from the various regions of India send their tender age children/relatives for slavery or sell them for their livelihood or pay their debt. But nowadays this crime is used basically for easy money source by the youth specially and there are many reasons behind it. The paper is finding out these reasons, make comparison and solution on that.

Literature review:

According to Louise Shelley "Rapid economic development of in India not decreasing trafficking. This is one of the most populous contries and trafficking may be more significant part of the problems than its cross-border component. Sex trafficking is increasing in Mumbai to satisfy increased customers demand. Girls from poorer rigionsof India brought to brothles of Mumbai. (2010:144) P. M. Nair penned down about Trafficking in Women and children in India. He has given various kind of information in general like Nodal agencies, Penal Code, Acts and Laws, Punishment, Rehabilitation of the victims, approach in dealing with trafficking in children and so on. (2005: 296....) S. Caroline Taylor and his friends given about the reasons of human trafficking in India like dowry system, dropout rate in the schools hence unemployment, increasing practices of prostitution, low female literacy rate, growth of cities attracts migration which is cause for commercial sexual exploitation and also given various measures for reducing this human trafficking (2013). As per the Nair's and Levenkron's studies, traffickers, whether active or convicted were generally between 30 and 40 years of old and poor and Indian traffickers made an average yearly income of \$2,674 in 2004 but this was about five times above the minimum wage in India at that time, it was no more than \$222 a month (Chenda Keo: 2014:26)

Objectives of the study:

- 1. To find out the percentage of human trafficking
- 2. To find out Types/ Methods of human trafficking
- 3. To scrutinise the reasons of the human trafficking
- 4. To make comparison of the previous and now situation
- 5. To provide suggestions to reduce it

Methodology:

The paper is completely review of the secondary data especially statistical data scrutinised and comparison made from that. Many articles, e-books, newspapers articles, websites and especially statistical images reviewed and comment on that.

Facts and findings:

Article 3 defines the components of trafficking as such: (a) 'trafficking in persons' shall mean "the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of a threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception of the abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability, or of giving or receiving payments or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person for the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall include, at a minimum, the exploitation of the purpose of exploitation. Exploitation shall include, at a minimum, the exploitation of others or other forms of sexual exploitation forced labour or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery, servitude or the removal of organs."

- · Almost 80% of all worldwide trafficking is for sexual exploitation,
- · 1.2 million children being bought and sold into sexual slavery every year,
- · India is the poisonous hub, for Asia and, some say, the world.
- · Of the 74 million south Asian women reported as missing,
- · 20 million are said to be working in Indian brothels.
- ·25% of women trafficked to India are under 18 years of age.
- ·More than 67,000 children in India went missing in 2014, of whom 45% were minors trafficked into prostitution.
- ·Indian young boys are sent to Dubai and other Middle-East countries for camel racing.
- ·Another area where children are frequently sent to is Saudi Arabia, where begging is an organized billion dollar industry, especially during Haj.
- ·A girl is abducted every eight minutes in India. (NCRB)
- ·A US report on human trafficking states that India is one of the world's main hubs for child sex trafficking.
- ·According to the National Human Rights Commission of India, over 40,000 children are reported missing every year of which over 11,000 remain untraced.
- · Andhra Pradesh, Bihar, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh and Maharashtra appear to be the main states from where trafficked persons are sourced, with the metro cities being the most frequent destination points.
- · 8,099 people were reported to be trafficked across India in 2014

There are several methods/causes of human trafficking such as:

- · Tempting offers of lucrative jobs in cities especially in metropolitans like Mumbai, Bangalore, Delhi, Chennai, Kolkata etc,
- · Due to poor economic condition, coerce parents and parents of many children would sale their child, especially daughters for their livelihood or repay the debts.
- · Sanction prostitution by tradition and custom to fulfil the demand of such customers.
- · False promises given by dupe and tricky people to the parents for their children or for the better economy.

- Organises false and exploitative marriages or deceptive promise of marriage by boyfriend.
- Entice children to offer sexual services in exchange for lucrative jobs, gifts, roles in movies,
- Kidnap of various age children for illegal activities
- Shows falsified travel documents and visa for good job in abroad
- Force to victim after beating, excessive torture, rape or gang rape and video, starvation, forced to use of drugs, threats to victim's family members

Human trafficking generally done by various groups of the society like family friends, relatives, neighbours, social circles such as, all over the world 42.5% pimps commonly recruits workers from social circles, 38.4% from neighbours, 21.9% from Internet or on strolls, schools 11%, from malls 4.1%, and from transit stations 2.7%

Human Trafficking by various groups:



In this figure it is clearly shown that 35% of human trafficking is doing by social circle like anyone from the society, those who are known person of the family or family member and 32% human trafficking is doing by Neighbours, 18% through internet communications and 9% from schools, 4% from malls and 2% from transit station as there are more security from various sources. It means utmost human trafficking is doing by society and neighbours than any other sources.

Under the Immoral Trafficking Prevention Act (ITPA) trafficking for commercial sexual exploitation is penalized. The punishment ranges from seven years' to life imprisonment. The Bonded Labour Abolition Act, the Child Labour Act, and the Juvenile Justice Act prohibit the bonded and forced labour in India. As per data from National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB), the number of registered human trafficking cases has increased 38.3% over five years from 2,848 in 2009 to 3,940 in 2013 - The

trafficking and following data proved it

State-wise data on human trafficking following states are disreputable included in the human in India during 2013 (As on 21.01.2014)




Figure 2 (Source: Govt. of India statistic)

In the figure no. 2, it shows that maximum human trafficking has done from the Rajasthan and Delhi, but most of the numbers uses for the forced labour than sexual exploitation. But rest of the states showing in the figure that they have utmost human trafficking for the purpose of sexual exploitation than for the purpose of child labour

Comparison of Human Trafficking from 2009 to 2014





Figure 3 (Source: NCRB)

Figure 3 shows that, in 2009, 2848 cases were recorded for human trafficking. Actual data could not be found as many states and individuals couldn't registered and a FIR about it, but while we studied for all these six years, every year there is growth in recorded cases and in 2014, 8099 cases were recorded, which are four times greater than the numbers recorded in 2009. It shows either there is awareness created amongst the people or crime will increase as fast as much.


Reasons/Types of Human Trafficking

As per the recorded data of 2014, in India human trafficking is increasing for the reasons of Sex trade for Sexual Exploitation, Forced Labour in Entertainment industry, Child Labour in Domestic work, Carpet & garment industries, Brick kilns, Hazardous Job, Forced Marriage, Begging, Maiming, Camel-jockeys, Drug Peddling, Petty Crimes, Organ Trans plant Child Pornography, Mail-order brides & Other reasons. But while we scrutinised, it is found that maximum cases from Rajasthan and Delhi caught for forced and child labour and from the rest of the state's maximum cases caught for sexual exploitation.

Figure 4 show here that, large number of female involved in sexual exploitation and domestic labour, but under the forced labour male are in more number. In removing organs, negligible cases are recorded in all India and it is surprising that only two cases were found in this area. Unknown exploitation included labour in various activities like Forced Marriage, Begging, Maiming, Cameljockeys, Drug Peddling, and Petty Crimes.

The data revealed by NCRB that, every year in India number of children are missing but the reported cases has shown in the figure 5. If we have seen from 1997, this figure is constantly increasing up to 2014 and according to NCRB from these missing children 45% are forcibly engaged in prostitution, rest of them are put into the forcible labour just 1% used for organs business. From these cases Govt. try to solve almost cases but a few cases till date unsolved and NCRB showing meagre % of unsolved cases

Recommendations:

It is difficult to find out proper solution to avoid this crime as the roots are very deep in various states and UT. Therefore we need strict rules and laws for protection of these weaker groups of society.

- · Provide human trafficking awareness training.
- · Avoid Child Labour or Forced Labour.
- · Offer community services or start an anti-trafficking coalition.
- · Donate funds or organize a fundraiser to an anti-trafficking organization.
- · Distribute public awareness materials in the Organised seminars, workshops, conferences on human trafficking
- · Try to prepare or encourage others for documentary on human trafficking.
- · Set up a Google alert to receive current human trafficking news.
- · Write articles regularly of your local Newspaper about human trafficking.
- · Start or sign a human trafficking petition.
- ·Provide internships, job skills training, or jobs to trafficking survivors.
- · Purchase items made by trafficking survivors
- · Students should take action in their campus.
- ·Prepare research papers on human trafficking topic.
- · Request that human trafficking be an issue included in university curriculum.

Conclusion:

In India human trafficking is increasing day by day, there is a need of restriction on such criminal activity. According to NCRB recorded cases are less as actual number of human trafficking is more, especially for sexual exploitation and forced labour. Therefore awareness of human trafficking should create at school level. If is a part of education curriculum, then students should aware about the topic and somehow it will reduce this criminal activity.

ZOMATO- Another Marketing Giant?

Zomato was Incorporated in the year 2008 (13 years ago) as "Foodiebay", later on it revamped itself as "Zomato media pvt. ltd" on Jan 18, 2010. It started its business as bringing menu cards of various hotels at one place and reviewing their food from Delhi NCR. Very rapidly they started expanding their services to other cities like Mumbai and Kolkata. Idea of Deepinder Goyal and Pankaj Chaddah (founder of Zomato) galvanized Sanjeev Bikchandani, founder of Naukri.com who helped them to raise funding of 1 million USD through his company Info edge India and from there Zomato was on fire. Pursuant to data of Dec 31,2020, Zomato has expanded it's business across 23 countries with 131,233 active food delivery restaurants,161,637 active delivery partners and on an average monthly food order of 10.7 million customers.

Main purpose for IPO is to meet general corporate purposes and for funding organic and inorganic growth initiatives. IPO was available for retail investors(15% of Total) on July 14,2021 which ended on July 16, 2021 and equity shares of company listed on BSE and NSE by end of July, whereas IPO price will vary from INR 72 to INR 76 per equity share with authorized capital of Rs. 9375 crore which was later on reduced to Rs. 5178.49 cr. It allocated 552.17 million equity shares to anchor investors some of them are Government of Singapore, Blackrock, Goldman Sachs, Abu-Dhabi Investment Authority. Info-edge shares raised almost 27% at early trade on BSE on July,14 as Zomato Ipo was opened for subscription (as it holds 18.55% stake in the food delivery platform). Zomato's IPO will boost lot of startups like Nykaa, Paytm, Policy-bazaar, Delhivery, Mobikwik and many more.

10. TAWANG (Arunachal Pradesh)


